SOMETHING NEW FOR PARARESCUE. Pararescuemen of the Aerospace Rescue and Recovery Service have adopted a new emblem to be worn on the maroon beret. - Designed by Capt Peter A.



Rundquist, ARRS Standardization Section, the new device incorporates the ARRS emblem --the Guardian Angel with the world in her grasp and the motto "That Others May Live." The pararescueman's role in the ARRS mission is portrayed by the parachute and shroud lines affixed atop the ARRS insignia. The new badges will be available through Base Exchange facilities in the near future and through regular Air Force Supply channels in approximately one year. A1C Duane D. Hackney, the only living enlisted man to be presented the Air Force Cross, was awarded one of the seven "proof" badges by Brig Gen Allison C. Brooks, ARRS Commander. The General presented the badge to Airman Hackney

at the annual Michigan Air Force Association Convention on October 7 in Detroit where he addressed some 200 AFA members as the convention's featured speaker.
